Needing Peace, Quiet and Prayer

Liz, Julia and I arrived at our destination tired, expecting to get a good night's sleep before beginning the project. But our actors, eager to start, came early the next morning. So much for sleeping in!

We recorded at the local Student-Led Movement (a Cru® ministry) center where a few college students live. Sometimes they came in for meetings or to hang out or study. We often had to ask people in the hallways to keep quiet. Birds outside the windows chirped so loudly we had to scare them away. The roar of motorcycles and the blare of car horns threatened our need for silence. Before meals we could hear people pounding yams. Several times a day trains rumbled past.

The film review posed the greatest challenge. The review committee members spent a lot of time discussing changes that needed to be made. I actually left the room and went on a prayer walk during this process, sending a message to our team back home to pray. When I came back my teammates revealed only six lines needed to be re-recorded! God truly answered.





Our dialogue director always smiled. He loved sharing his favorite local dish, fufu (boiled and ground plantain or cassava), with us.

Many Ewe profess Christ but need to be more solidly grounded in their faith. Walking With Jesus gives ministry workers a unique tool to help do that. Outside of the cities more people practice voodoo. The middle region of the country has a high Muslim population. Nonbelievers are often captivated by the stories in this film series.

Walking With Jesus relates well to the culture in Togo. So many of the issues addressed in the episodes are things Togolese people know firsthand. As they watch the film series, they see how problems are corrected from a biblical perspective. This encourages them to live more fully for Christ.

Pastor Pierre voiced the announcer in the film. He and one of our coordinators, who we called Mama, do film showings all over Togo. One time they showed the French *Walking With Jesus* to 22 chiefs of various villages. Eight became believers! Showing the film to the chiefs before the rest of the villagers honors them. Then they welcome Pastor Pierre and Mama into their villages, whether the chiefs are believers or not. Many chiefs practice forms of voodoo. They think it gives them more power.

Church leaders will let village chiefs know they're coming to show the Ewe *Walking With Jesus*. They want to have each chief's blessing and know it will be safe for them to share this great teaching.





Voice acting is hard work, especially when you are trying to match your words to the lip movements in the film. Our actors found the most unique places to rest during their breaks.

Personal Thoughts

Everyone in Togo's capital speaks French. Our dialogue director became frustrated at times when the younger voice actors had trouble pronouncing Ewe words correctly. *Walking With Jesus* can help preserve the language in the capital city. In the villages the reverse is true. Most only know Ewe and don't speak French at all. Each language is important and part of people's identity and history.

This was my favorite recording trip. I loved working with the Togolese. I felt like we were just hanging out with friends, and now they truly *are* dear friends.
